# Shanty Irish and Award-Winning Piper Andrew Donlon to Perform at 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Burns Supper

ocal favorite Shanty Irish will perform at the Cumberland Scottish Rite Knights of St. Andrew 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Burns Supper celebrating the life and poetry of Robert "Rabbie" Burns

on Saturday, February 2, 2019, at the Cumberland Masonic Temple, 15 Greene Street, Cumberland. Shanty Irish is a traditional Irish Folk band based in Western Maryland. They will perform a mix of Irish and Celtic favorites ranging from The Clancy Brothers to the Pogues.

This festive celebration will include a traditional Scottish meal, bagpipers piping in the haggis, readings of Burns' poetry, and a toast to the immortal memory of Scotland's beloved son. Burns, best known for his poem (and song) "Auld Lang Syne", is widely



regarded as the national poet of Scotland and is celebrated worldwide at Burns Nights on or near the anniversary of his birthday on January 25, 1759.

Additional musical performances will be provided by Andrew Donlon, who is a professionally graded bagpiper in the Eastern United States Pipe Band Association, and has won contests in the



United States, Canada and Scotland as a soloist and bandsman. An active competitor, Donlon won Overall Champion for the EUSPBA in Grade 1 for both 2012 and 2013, and has been a successful professional competitor since, winning the Piobaireachd at the 2014 Perth Highland Games in Scotland among other prizes in 2014. 2015 saw Andrew win the U.S. Silver Medal for Piobaireachd at Winter Storm in Kansas City, Missouri as well as Champion Piper at the Southern Maryland Games, Ohio Games, and Virginia Games in the United States and at the Ballater Highland Games in Scotland. Andrew is still an active prize winning professional throughout North America and Scotland.

Proceeds from the Burns Supper support the work of the Scottish Rite Speech and Language Disorders Clinic at the Children's League. The

Knights extend a warm welcome to our brethren from across the Orient of Maryland to join us for this evening of fun and fellowship for a great cause.

The Fall Ritual Champion is a man you well know, his efforts are as numerous as his titles, but his work in the conferral of the thirty-second degree this fall made him shine anew. It did not hurt for some of us to witness him deliver the Third Degree lecture at Queen City Lodge No. 131 during their 2018 Past Masters night. The Ill. Kenneth A. Robertson, 33° made an impact on Freemasonry this fall and for that we award him the recognition as the Fall Ritual Champion. Ken was humble upon receiving the recognition at the Capping ceremony yet the President of the Class Marc Valentine quickly pointed out that the work was remarkable and therefore impressive to the new candidates. Congratulations to Ken Robertson and those who aspire to ritualistic excellence, that kind of ritual work that makes Freemasonry remarkable.

It is with that thought in mind that I would turn our attention to the impressive ritual work that many of our members have heard over time. We remember the Worshipful Master who gave the first impressive lecture as if it were yesterday, we comment "now that was awesome." Ninety percent of the time you are not the only one who remembers that Warden or Master that can nail a lecture or charge because it is remarkable. The craft is built on remarkable work, without impressive ritual we are just another fraternity. Think back..... did that impressive ritualistic styled Worshipful Master have a following? Of course he did and why is that? I think the reason is obvious, men naturally want to be better than they envision themselves. Candidates seek what we promise them, to improve ourselves in Masonry. candidates fail to grasp the concept that the ritual was impressive or is it that the ritual was not remarkable?

Therein lies our opportunity.......This generation of men are not easily impressed. Our opportunity with them is short-lived, they expedite information like we look out the window of a moving car, they choose what they like and dislike without a second thought and on to the next thing as a routine. Occasionally, we land an individual who has had that captivating moment, and we are momentarily relieved for that success. Our struggle is to provide the impressive style ritual that the Fall Champion, and his counterparts have provided recently. Our goal is to create an experience that beckons men to follow Freemasonry. Anything less than remarkable ritual from opening to closing is, in my opinion, detrimental to our fraternity. Our local Leadership considers consolidation that nobody wants because the craft's ritualists/officers are too few for so many Lodges to operate independently.

The Officers, and members of the Scottish Rite must be prepared to conquer the ritual work as if we are at war, because we are in a jealous battle for Freemasonry's fraternal superiority. A new candidate's foremost request of their expectations of Freemasonry is self-improvement. Our opportunity to deliver on our promise to mentor this new generation begins today with each of us. Let's do our best to make it a remarkable experience.

reetings from the Lodge of Perfection. As we enter into the holiday season, the officers of the Lodge of Perfection wish you and yours a glorious holiday season and prosperous New Year. Once again the year is coming to a close. As we reflect on the past year, we can all be proud of the work we have done and look with excited anticipation at the work we have yet to accomplish. We can reflect with fond remembrance in the fellowship we had and say a prayer for our brothers who have passed to the celestial lodge above.

In between the turducken (turducken is a Lane tradition consisting of a deboned chicken stuffed into a deboned duck, further stuffed into a deboned turkey it's unbelievable-but I digress), football, family gettogethers, eggnog, and the opening of presents, I ask you to reflect upon the year gone by and to renew your resolve to serve God, a brother, and all mankind. For to be a Scottish Rite Mason, in the truest sense of the title,

is to care.

If one were to look up the word "care" in the dictionary one would find that as a noun the word "care" has six senses, and as a verb five senses. The definitions describe the feelings and actions that underline our obligation as Scottish Rite Free Masons; however the Queen's English definitions do not adequately grasp what care means to a mason. The dictionary definitions separate the meaning of the word into either a noun or a verb.

To a Mason the word "care" is a noun and a verb at the same time. The word does not simply describe our obligation, but is our obligation in the form of action, not simply feeling. The symbolism of the three steps is a wonderful example of masonic "caring"; we industriously occupy our mind to obtain useful knowledge that we may discharge that knowledge to our respective duties to God, a brother, and to all mankind; so that we may look back fondly on a well-spent life and die in the hope of a glorious immortality. In this symbolism we see our obligation of care acts in unison as a noun and a verb. As a noun denoting acts or actions; attention and management implying responsibility for safety and prosperity; as a verb a feeling of concern or interest; be in charge of, act on, or dispose of. There is a certain intangible bond between brothers, their God, and their fellowmen that can only be forged by a Masonic understanding of the word or action "to care."

So where is this taking us? Nowhere really, I am not telling you anything you don't already know; just sometimes in our busy life, especially during this time of year we all need to be reminded that caring is the greatest attribute of a mason. I leave you with a stanza from the poem an *Old Masters Wages*:

To all Masonic Brothers, The only secret is to care, May you live your life upon the level, May you part upon the square.
