
To Benefit RiteCare at The Children's League

Master Craftsman Study Group Coming This Fall

As you may have heard, the three-part Master Craftsman program is being converted from correspondence course to an online format (hyperlink to article for online blurb) As part of this program, the Ritual and History course is currently being offered, giving a fascinating overview of the history of Freemasonry in general, and a comprehensive outline of the Scottish Rite. If you've ever wanted to know more about the rich history and ritual of the Scottish Rite, this is a great opportunity.

The coursework consists of six open-book tests, which are submitted online. You will get online feedback from the scorer.

In order to increase participation and, very importantly, to make this an opportunity for connecting and getting to know one another better across the Valley, with members from Oakland in the West to Smithsburg in the East, and beyond, we are planning to establish a study or guided discussion group using the Valley's Zoom account. Bro. Steve Gaudette has volunteered to coordinate this effort by helping with registration and hosting monthly to bimonthly study sessions on Zoom, as needed.

No format can entirely replace meeting in person, but we've discovered that when the topic is engaging and well directed, Zoom can be an excellent way of sharing information while overcoming the difficulties of getting to and from in-person meetings, given our busy lives and schedules.

We're going to try to make this as fun and informal as possible, while keeping sight of our goal of finishing this portion of the program and sharing questions, observations, and personal knowledge of the topic.

We are planning to have the first online session in mid-October to give everyone more time to register, look the material over and get comfortable with the technology required. Again, we want to make this fun, informal, and enlightening.

Temple Board Series I



This report about the Cumberland Masonic Temple is the first of a series of reports that are normally done in Lodge but will now appear in the Perfect Elu newsletter, by email, and on social media

As you may know, the Cumberland Masonic Temple, Inc. is now an IRS 501(c)3 Tax Exempt Charitable organization, which means that donations made to the Temple are now tax deductible. As a recognized public charity, the Temple is also eligible to pursue a wide range of public and private grants to support historic restoration and educational and cultural programming. This is very good news for the future of our Temple and the many organizations that call it home!

It is a testament to the Masonic virtue of Charity that the Cumberland Scottish Rite and our members have given so generously to local charities over the years. For example, the Leonard and Jane Schwab Scottish Rite Foundation Scholarship at Allegany College provides an enduring legacy to these honored members of our Scottish Rite family and their support of local students pursuing higher education. In addition, Frostburg State University's Pealer Recital Hall bears the name of Scottish Rite Brother Woody Pealer and his wife Jenny in recognition of their significant contributions to Frostburg State University and numerous other local organizations.

However, because donations to the Masonic Temple were not previously tax deductible, the Temple has been absent from most charitable giving lists, frequently leading many of our own members to share hefty monetary gifts with other worthy causes instead. After years of debating an idea first planted by former board member Lynn Workmeister, and with the support of the Grand Lodge of Maryland, Temple Board President Rick Gornall enlisted the help of Jeff Conner and Robin Summerfield to take the steps necessary to receive tax deductible contributions.

While we can certainly be proud of the many contributions our members have made to local museums, educational institutions, healthcare facilities, and cultural organizations as well as the contributions the Scottish Rite Foundation has made to support our RiteCare clinics at the Children's League, the time has come for us to direct some of our charity towards preserving our home at the Cumberland Masonic Temple.

In the time since my recent report to the Rite membership on the operations of the Cumberland Masonic Temple, I am pleased to report that \$300 in individual donations to the Temple has been received from members of the Scottish Rite. Thanks to Curtis Haines and Marc Valentine for all your volunteer and financial support.

Brethren, if the Cumberland Masonic Temple is to remain our home without requiring steadily increasing and unsustainable assessments from our members, we must develop additional sources of revenue. This year alone, in addition to dipping into our limited endowment funds, the responsibility to maintain our Temple has necessitated collecting more than \$25,000 in extra assessments from our tenant organizations above and beyond those for which they had planned.

The Board of Directors of the Temple is currently in the process of planning a major fundraising campaign in order to grow the Temple endowment fund to a level that will generate sufficient annual revenue to maintain our beautiful Temple now and well into the future. We recently sought advice about fundraising goals and tools from David Jones, Executive Director of the Allegany College of Maryland Foundation. Jones, who has had tremendous success growing the ACM Foundation endowments as well as winning numerous grants to support capital projects and academic programs on the ACM campus, offered some excellent suggestions to consider as we develop our campaign.

First and foremost, he emphasized the importance of asking those who have the most stake in the future of the Temple to demonstrate their support early in the campaign. By making a personally meaningful gift, each stakeholder demonstrates their commitment and trust in the organization and enables them to function as a more credible fundraiser and to inspire other donors.

With this in mind, I am asking each Scottish Rite member to consider making a one-time donation of ten dollars – or more if you are able – as a down payment to kick off the campaign. While this may seem like a modest individual contribution, collectively it would generate nearly \$8,000 to get the campaign off to a strong start and inspire others to give. If you can participate, please mail a check payable to Cumberland Masonic Temple, Inc., c/o Jerry Robinette, 73 LaVale Blvd, LaVale, MD 21502.

The Cumberland Scottish Rite Foundation will also be initiating a new memorial program to support the Temple

while creating a legacy in honor of our fallen brothers. For many years, the Cumberland Scottish Rite has made annual contributions to our Foundation as a memorial to our departed brethren. The Contributions have been maintained in a designated fund, which has now reached a sufficient level to sustain years of charitable giving. Beginning in 2020, the Cumberland Scottish Rite Foundation will contribute \$100 to the Cumberland Masonic Temple, Inc. for the purchase of an engraved memorial brick on the front terrace in the memory of each of our fallen brothers. We expect this program to generate approximately \$3,500 in additional annual revenue to the Temple. We hope the several Lodges and Bodies who call the Cumberland Masonic Temple home will consider similar initiatives.

The Temple fundraising campaign is likely to include a number of traditional giving options for donors, including outright and installment gifts, bequests, appreciated securities, charitable remainder trusts, life insurance, and others. If you are currently making a plan for your charitable giving or if you have been putting it off, I encourage you to consider including the Cumberland Masonic Temple, Inc. as part of your legacy.

One very bold idea I am proposing to the Temple Board of Directors is to consider naming individual rooms in the Temple in recognition of individuals, families, or organizations who provide major donations at predetermined levels.



For example, Allegany College of Maryland has a program wherein an auditorium or classroom is named after a family who makes a particularly generous donation to the school. Danny and Dottie Thomas are the most recent Scottish Rite family members to have their names immortalized at the college's new Welcome Center in honor of their significant contributions. Some of our members may remember that the Cumberland Scottish Rite made contribution for this purpose as part of the room naming program for the Western Maryland Regional Hospital several years ago. Along with room naming opportunities, this program could include creating a Donor wall in the

Temple to recognize all past, present, and future donors. It will take time to formulate and get approval for such a bold idea, but I am hopeful we can create such a donor incentive program as part of the Cumberland Masonic Temple fundraising campaign.

With your aid we will get past COVID-19 and these strange and unpleasant times. In the weeks to come I will report on other changes and especially good ideas that will not require your money but, more importantly, your unwavering support to accomplish.

Feast of Tishri and Fall Capping Ceremony Set for November 8th



The Feast of Tishri will be held at the Cumberland Masonic Temple on Greene Street in conjunction with the Fall Capping Ceremony, on November 8th. The Council of Kadosh will host the event and a Thanksgiving style meal will be served. Social distancing guidelines will be observed. Please use the RSVP form to respond.

The origin of The Feast of Tishri is described in the book of Leviticus where it is said that the Lord spoke unto Moses, saying that on the fifteenth day of the month of Tishri of the Hebrew civil

calendar, "ye shall have gathered in the fruit of the land, ye shall keep a feast unto the Lord." The Feast of Tishri is the Hebrew equivalent of Thanksgiving or Harvest festival (Lincoln, 2018).

The Feast of Tabernacles (Tishri) also commemorates the ceremonies of the completion and dedication of King Solomon's Temple, which began in the year 2992 A.L.*, and finished in a little more than seven years. Six months after its completion, in the month of Tishri—the seventh month of the Jewish calendar—the temple was dedicated with reverential ceremonies to the one Living and True God (Ancient & Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, Orient of Maryland, 2015). No other occasion epitomizes the character and purpose of the Feast of Tishri more wholly than the temple dedication. The rich legendry of the Temple's dedication, celebrated during the Feast of Tishri, is an essential part of the Fourteenth Degree (2015).

By observing the Feast of Tishri, Scottish Rite Masons share the fraternal spirit and reaffirm our dedication to human concord and the brotherhood of all men. As Brothers, we resolve to build, as King Solomon did, peace for all mankind (2018). We pray blessings upon you and hope to be honored with your presence.

SOME THOUGHTS FROM THE MOUNTAIN TOP III. James M Snider, 33° Venerable Master




WHERE ARE WE NOW? What is Freemasonry? The answer would seem simple....an esoteric fraternity. If you really pursue the question even more - one is likely to get answers like brotherhood, enlightenment, ancient symbolism and others which may reflect on the history of the fraternity. As Freemasons, we think very highly of our organization and are always happy to talk about it and explain why we joined. Freemasonry does have a noble and prestigious past and all the poetic language sounds nice but what is Freemasonry? Why does it exist in the first place? The most common answer is "to seek enlightenment"? Do we now have an answer to our question of what is Freemasonry? If so, where do we find this enlightenment that was posed? I KNOW......in Scottish Rite it must be those members wearing the white hats or the gray haired members wearing the red hats...these are the ones that possess the leadership, wisdom and knowledge of this sought after enlightenment....these masters, if you will, must be enlightened....but they are just men! Maybe we didn't look at the words carefully enough - "seek enlightenment". So now that changes things.....we are not expected to find enlightenment but to seek

enlightenment! This view is better embodied by a different answer - "to take good men and make them better". How is this accomplished? The answer from any Mason will be through ritual and symbolism. Albert Pike once stated that "symbolism" was the soul of freemasonry. We all should understand that educating ourselves creates knowledge and growth thus making us better men! Perhaps this is the reason the founding fathers of Freemasonry felt continued growth was important. I also believe there is another reason...one that is important to our society, our community and our families. This answer can be found in the 9th Degree of the Scottish Rite....."Albert Pike's interpretation of these degrees (8th and 9th) presented a moral and philosophical lesson that found its origin in the rituals he studied". (SR Ritual, Monitor & Guide). When speaking of the three ruffians (those that attack Hiram Abiff) Pike felt they represented spiritual tyrants that symbolized three chief vices that are enemies of human progress namely - ignorance, fanaticism and ambition. I believe this is the true reason why we must continue to educate ourselves to preserve the future of our fraternity and communities. As Pike states in his book Esoterica, only 3 out of every 100 initiated masons will consider and regard ritual and symbolism of any value. **SO WHERE ARE WE NOW**?

We could take a final step and become what freemasonry was never intended to be - a charity! This is not a hard thing to do.....all one would have to do is nothing and it will evolve. Or we could pursue the original goal -"to take good men and make them better". How much better is up to the individual but if the ritual is done properly, it can and will instill the old desire for enlightenment through symbolism. This was the whole point of the Masonic ritual that was established by those far wiser than we are today! It is possible to turn freemasonry around but a choice must be made - as the 32nd degree teaches "we have come to where the roads diverge" - which path do we take? If we are truly Master Masons then the answer is simple.... you and I must become educated men about our fraternity or otherwise we may lose all that we hold dear in Masonry and in our lives!
